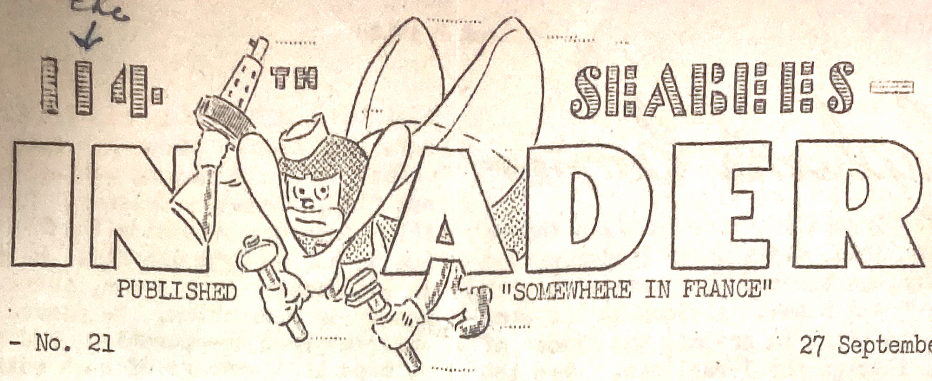

BATTALION SAYS ITS FAREWELL TO KALTENBACH

Comdr. Earl G. Kaltenbach, OinC of the 114th since the Battalion was organized just a year ago, has left this Battalion for a new assignment.

Men of the Battalion who have known the Commander, either at the austere proceedings of the Captain's Mast or through personal association or contact made during his year of command, have found him to be kindly, just and sympathetic. It is with genuine regret that the Battalion bids "adieu" to the able helmsman, who guided this Battalion through its first year.

Commander Kaltenbach assumed the post of Officer-in-Charge when the 114th was formed at Camp Peary on Aug. 11, 1943.

He then held the rank of lieutenant-commander, and his able executive officer, D. L. Crabtree, held the rank of lieutenant. On Sept. 25, 1943, both men were promoted one rank.

The Commander was born in Wheeling, W. Va., and received his grammar and high school education there, after which he was a student at the United States Military Academy at West Point for a three-and-a-half-year period until he left because of ill health. On his recovery, he returned to his studies and completed a course at the University of West Virginia, graduating with the degree of civil engineer. Before receiving his Naval CEC commission, the Commander was for many years chief engineer of the machine design division of the Dravo Manufacturing Co. of Pittsburgh.

114TH WELCOMES GESSNER, OFFICER IN CHARGE

Comdr. Edward H. Gessner, former OinC of the 146th U. S. Naval Construction Battalion, took command of the combined 146th and 114th Battalions during the past week at an informal meeting of officers of the combined organizations.

The 146th Battalion has officially lost its identity as a battalion, and the combination of units will be known henceforth as the 114th U.S. Naval Construction Battalion. Under the present setup the men of the 146th will continue to function within the 114th as a POL unit, and there will be no apparent change in the working plan of the original 114th - it will continue to do its job as a standard Naval Construction Battalion.

The new OinC went on active service in the Navy on July 9, 1941, as a lieutenant.

His first assignment was at the U.S. Naval Air Station at Alameda, Calif., where he served until Jan. 1, 1943, at which time he was reassigned as executive officer of the 64th Seabee Battalion. March 1, 1943, he was promoted to Lieutenant-Commander, and in May of that year, he took over command of the 64th Battalion, which then was engaged in naval construction activity in Newfoundland. In August last year, Comdr. Gessner was promoted to his present rank.

In January of 1944, the 64th Battalion returned to the United States after 10 months duty in Newfoundland and the Commander was de-

gone ahead quietly and continued on with the job at hand. There will be time enough for celebration when that work is completed and the 114th and all of the other glorious Seabee battalions will exist no more except in the bright pages of the naval history of the United States.

Men of the Battalion, however, will long remember that day in September, 1943, when on the parade ground of Old Camp Endicott they were officially welcomed into the brotherhood of Seabee battalions. It was a glorious and fitting climax to their successful graduation from the United States Naval Construction Training Center at Davisville, R. I.

For a while the 114th became the movin'est outfit of them all. Sept. 20, 1944, the battalion moved as a unit to Sun Valley, which was to be its home for the following three weeks. Then the Battalion baggage was again in transit and the men were setting up residence under the shady elms at the Advance Base Depot at Davisville, R. I. After two weeks there orders came to move to Lido Beach, L.I., which became the home of the unit for the next nine months. For those nine long but pleasant months the unit successfully fought the "battle of ABATU" (Advance Base & Training Unit) as well as minor engagements in the nearby communities of Freeport, Jamaica, Mineola, Far Rockaway and many et cetera towns, not forgetting of course, Brooklyn, the unofficial capital of the United States.

But, as all good things must sooner or later come to an end, the Battalion eventually received orders to evacuate and on July 24, 1944, it boarded ship for the well known "unknown destination".

The remainder of the battalion history is too recent to bear recounting except perhaps to say that the unit, recently augmented by the 146th Seabees, many of the members of which are veterans of more than 22 months of overseas service, looks forward to an eventful second year of life.

tached from that unit and ordered to the United Kingdom, where he was given the task of forming the 146th Battalion, with a nucleus of one company of the 28th Battalion, which at that time had already seen 16 months of overseas service in Iceland.

Another company, which was known as Special Draft No. 2296, made up the other component of what subsequently became the 146th. At the time of formation the 146th was the first Seabee battalion to be formed in the European Theater of Operations.

Comdr. Gessner has been OinC since the date of its formation, and in assuming command of the 114th he retains that command by virtue of the merger of the two battalions for operational purposes.

The Commander was born in New Orleans on Aug. 29, 1906, and grew up and received his primary and secondary education there, after which he entered Tulane University, where he had two years of pre-medical study, after which he changed to an engineering course at the same institution. He subsequently obtained his degree in civil engineering there.

Accepting his command of the 114th Battalion, Comdr. Gessner issued this statement:

"I take this opportunity to greet each of you in the capacity of Officer - in-Charge of the 114th Construction Battalion. You have already established yourself as one of the best outfits in the Seabees, therefor our goal will begin from that point, and each member will exert every effort to be a personal example of proper military bearing, neatness, uniformity, willingness and aggressiveness. The 114th Seabees, through individual adoption of such policy, will be in position at all times to surmount any task, regardless of nature or magnitude.

"It is a matter of both pleasure and pride to be affiliated with the 114th Seabees."

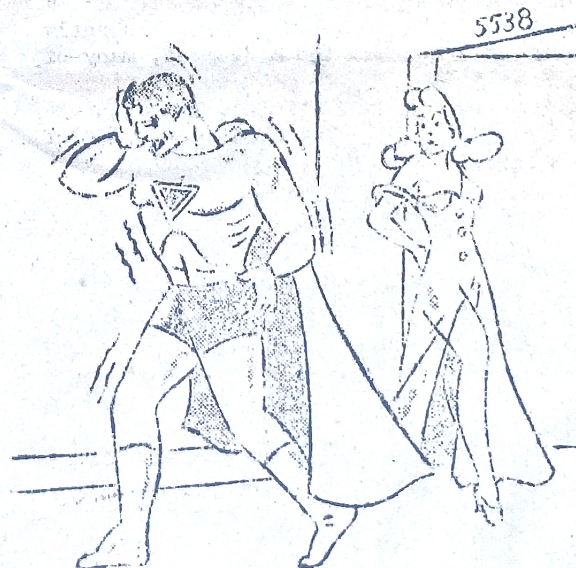

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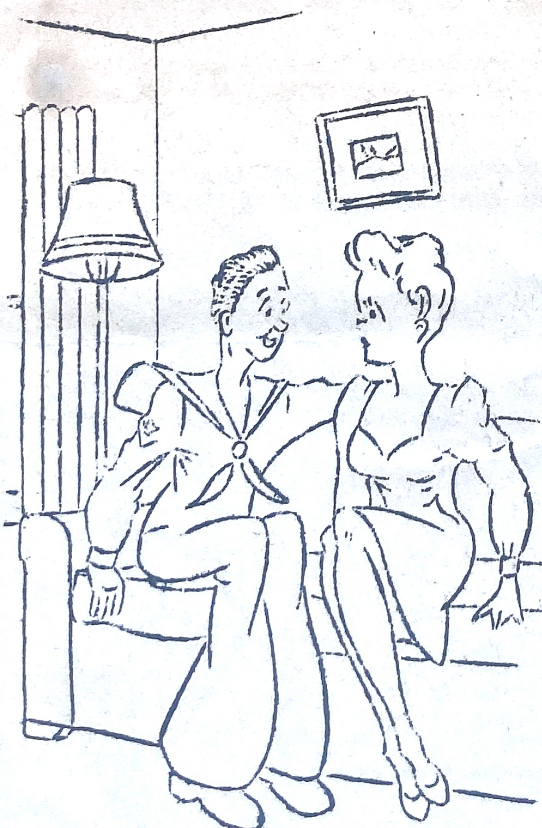
114TH BATTALION'S BAND BEING REORGANIZED

FEDERAL VOTING SCHEDULED IN CAMPS OCT. 2

Oct. 2 has been designated by the OinC as voting day for the men of the 114th entitled to vote by federal ballot.

The office of the Executive Officer at Camp No. 1 has been designated as the voting place for the men of the Battalion who are living there. In general, persons who are entitled to vote by federal ballot must qualify (1) by being residents of one of the 20 states which have brought themselves under the federal balloting plan. A list of those states should be posted on all bulletin boards. If not, the information may be obtained from the voting officer. (2) The person wishing to vote under the soldier vote system must be an American citizen, 21 years of age or over (18 in Georgia), and (3) the voter must have applied for a state ballot before Sept. 1 and not received it by Oct. 1

NO NAVAL REDUCTION UNTIL PACIFIC WAR WON

The defeat of Germany will bring about no demobilization of the Navy, according to an official Navy Department announcement of recent date.

EIGHT SEABEES DIE IN NORMANDY'S INVASION

New official reports from Construction Battalion headquarters in France reveal that eight Seabees were killed in action during the invasion of Normandy last June.

There were exactly 71 Seabees wounded in this action, and three have been reported missing in the same action. These figures, however, do not include Seabee demolition units.

The number of casualties is said to be far fewer than was anticipated, in view of the extreme hazard of the entire undertaking. Allied air superiority held down the casualties.
